Preface

Household Consumption Expenditure Surveys (HCES) are being conducted by the National Statistics Office (NSO) on a regular basis since the inception of National Sample Survey in the year 1950 by the legendary scholar, Professor P. C. Mahalanobis. Data of HCES is the primary source of information to assess trends in economic well-being and to determine and update the basket of consumer goods and services and weights used for the calculation of the Consumer Price Index. Food consumption data compiled from HCES are an important source of information on food security and nutrition. The data of HCES is also used by various international organisations for compilation and updation of various indicators related development and economic well-being. The Food and Agricultural Organisation (FAO) uses it for compilation of indicator on Prevalence of Undernourishment and the World Bank utilizes HCES data for determination of level poverty.

With a view to meet the vital need of data requirement of various users, the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) decided to conduct two back-to-back surveys on the subject during August 2022 to July 2023 and August 2023 to July 2024. The report of the first survey undertaken in 2022-23 has already been published in June 2024. On completion of the second survey, a factsheet with key findings has been released in December 2024.

This publication is the detailed report of HCES 2023-24, providing estimates of various aspects of household consumer expenditure at both state and all-India levels. The report includes rural and urban averages of Monthly Per Capita Consumption Expenditure (MPCE) at the State/UT and all-India levels, as well as the absolute and percentage breakdown of MPCE by consumption categories and fractile classes for each State/UT and all-India.

The Household Survey Division (HSD) of the NSO developed the survey methodology, compiled and processed the survey data and prepared this document. The Field Operations Division conducted the fieldwork, while the Coordination and Quality Control Division liaison various survey activities.

I am grateful to the Chairman and members of the Steering Committee of National Statistical Commission and the Technical Advisory Group for household surveys for their valuable suggestions and guidance throughout the survey. I also express my gratitude to the officers of HSD, involved in preparing this report.

I hope this report will be valuable to policymakers, academics, researchers, and others interested in this subject. Suggestions for improving its content and coverage are highly appreciated.

प्रस्तावना

महान विद्वान प्रोफेसर पी. सी. महालनोबिस द्वारा वर्ष 1950 में राष्ट्रीय प्रतिदर्श सर्वेक्षण की शुरुआत के बाद से राष्ट्रीय सांख्यिकी कार्यालय (एनएसओ) द्वारा नियमित आधार पर घरेलू उपभोग व्यय सर्वेक्षण संचालित (एचसीईएस) किए जा रहे हैं। एचसीईएस का डेटा आर्थिक कल्याण में रुझानों का आकलन करने और उपभोक्ता मूल्य सूचकांक की गणना के लिए उपयोग की जाने वाली उपभोक्ता वस्तुओं की टोकरी और सेवाओं तथा भार को निर्धारित करने और अद्यतन करने के लिए सूचना का प्राथमिक स्रोत है। एचसीईएस से संकलित खाद्य उपभोग डेटा खाद्य सुरक्षा और पोषण पर सूचना का एक महत्वपूर्ण स्रोत है। एचसीईएस के डेटा का उपयोग विभिन्न अंतर्राष्ट्रीय संगठनों द्वारा विकास और आर्थिक कल्याण से संबंधित विभिन्न संकेतकों के संकलन और अद्यतन के लिए भी किया जाता है। खाद्य और कृषि संगठन (एफएओ) इसका उपयोग कुपोषण की व्यापकता पर संकेतक के संकलन के लिए करता है और विश्व बैंक गरीबी के स्तर के निर्धारण के लिए एचसीईएस डेटा का उपयोग करता है।

विभिन्न उपयोगकर्ताओं की डेटा आवश्यकता को पूरा करने के उद्देश्य से सांख्यिकी और कार्यक्रम कार्यान्वयन मंत्रालय ने अगस्त 2022 से जुलाई 2023 और अगस्त 2023 से जुलाई 2024 के दौरान इस विषय पर दो बैक-टू-बैक सर्वेक्षण आयोजित करने का निर्णय लिया है। वर्ष 2022-23 में किए गए पहले सर्वेक्षण की रिपोर्ट जून 2024 में पहले ही प्रकाशित हो चुकी है। दूसरे सर्वेक्षण के पूरा होने पर, प्रमुख निष्कर्षों वाली एक फैक्टशीट दिसंबर 2024 में जारी की गई है।

यह प्रकाशन एचसीईएस 2023-24 की विस्तृत रिपोर्ट है, जो राज्य और अखिल भारतीय स्तर पर घरेलू उपभोक्ता व्यय के विभिन्न पहलुओं का अनुमान प्रदान करती है। रिपोर्ट में राज्य/संघ राज्य क्षेत्र और अखिल भारतीय स्तर पर मासिक प्रति व्यक्ति उपभोग व्यय (एमपीसीई) के ग्रामीण और शहरी औसत के साथ-साथ प्रत्येक राज्य/संघ राज्य क्षेत्र तथा अखिल भारतीय स्तर पर उपभोग श्रेणियों और फ्रैक्टाइल वर्गों के अनुसार एमपीसीई का पूर्ण और पृथक प्रतिशत शामिल है।

एनएसओं के घरेलू सर्वेक्षण प्रभाग (एचएसडी) ने सर्वेक्षण पद्धति विकसित की, सर्वेक्षण डेटा को संकलित और संसाधित किया और यह दस्तावेज़ तैयार किया। क्षेत्र संकार्य प्रभाग ने फील्डवर्क का संचालन किया, जबकि समन्वय और गुणवत्ता नियंत्रण प्रभाग ने विभिन्न सर्वेक्षण गतिविधियों का समन्वय किया।

मैं राष्ट्रीय सांख्यिकीय आयोग की संचालन सिमिति के अध्यक्ष और सदस्यों तथा घरेलू सर्वेक्षणों के लिए तकनीकी सलाहकार समूह की आभारी हूँ, जिन्होंने सर्वेक्षण के दौरान बहुमूल्य सुझाव दिए और मार्गदर्शन किया। मैं इस रिपोर्ट को तैयार करने में शामिल एचएसडी के अधिकारियों के प्रति भी आभार व्यक्त करती हूँ।

- The National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) has been conducting Household Consumption Expenditure Survey (HCES) since the inception of National Sample Survey in the year 1950.
- Information collected in HCES helps to assess trends in economic well-being and to determine and update the basket of consumer goods and services. It is also used for the calculation of the weights for Consumer Price Indices.
- The latest survey (HCES: 2023-24) has been conducted during the period August, 2023 to July, 2024 in which information has been collected from 2,61,953 Households (1,54,357 in rural areas and 1,07,596 in urban areas) spread over all States and Union Territories in the country.
- Prior to this, a survey of similar scale was conducted during August 2022 to July 2023.



Average MPCE (Rs.) during 2011-12 to 2023-24: All-India


Average MPCE (Rs.) at nominal price




Average MPCE (Rs.) at 2011-12 prices




Average MPCE (Rs.) by Fractile classes in 2022-23 and 2023-24: All-India






Trend in share of food items in average MPCE during 2022-23 & 2023-24: All-India









Cumulative share (%) of different decile classes in total consumption expenditure in 2022-23 and 2023-24: All-India







Average MPCE (Rs.) of major states and their relative position with All-India in 2023-24







Average MPCE (Rs.) of major states in 2022-23 and 2023-24

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1.1 BACKGROUND

1.1.0 The Household Consumption Expenditure Survey (HCES) is designed to collect information on consumption and expenditure of the households on goods and services. HCES provides data required to assess trends in economic well-being and to determine and update the basket of consumer goods and services. It is also used to compute the weights for compilation of the Consumer Price Index. Data collected in HCES is a vital input in developing measures for welfare, poverty, inequality and also for formulating and monitoring economic and social welfare policies, especially for different segments of the population. Analysis of HCES data over times inform us about how the level of living and consumption behaviour of the households change over time, and about how levels of living vary among individuals and groups in the economy. Food consumption data compiled from HCES are an important source of information on food security and nutrition intake.

1.1.1 In view of the recommendations of the National Statistical Commission (NSC), it was planned to undertake the next survey on household consumption expenditure during July, 2020 to June, 2021. Later, the Ministry of Statistics & Programme Implementation (MoSPI) decided to conduct two back-to-back surveys on the subject to facilitate a decision on revision of the base year for macro-economic indicators, like Gross Domestic Product (GDP), Consumer Price Indices (CPI) etc. However, the emergence of COVID-19 pandemic delayed the launch of the survey fieldwork. Subsequently, after return of

normalcy, two consecutive surveys have been planned during the period August, 2022 to July, 2023 and August, 2023 to July, 2024. After completion of the fieldwork of the first survey, a factsheet has been published by MoSPI in February, 2024 and thereafter, the detailed report of the survey along with the unit level data has been released in June, 2024. A factsheet containing summary results of HCES: 2023-24 has been published in December 2023. This is the detailed report of HCES: 2023-24.

1.2 PAST SURVEYS

1.2.0 The National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) has been conducting surveys on household consumption expenditure since the inception of the National Sample Survey (NSS) in the year 1951. Thereafter, surveys on consumption expenditure had been conducted at regular intervals as part of NSS rounds, normally of one-year duration. The data on household consumption expenditure were collected in every round up to the 28th (1973-74). After the 26th round (1971-72) of the survey, the then Governing Council of NSSO decided to conduct the surveys on consumption expenditure and employment-unemployment together on a large scale, once in every five years. From the 42nd round (1986-87), on the basis of the recommendation of the Governing Council, NSS had started annual surveys of consumption expenditure in a smaller-scale with an abridged version of the schedule and thin sample. This annual series was continued till NSS 64th round (2007-08).

1.2.1 The quinquennial surveys were conducted and results were published in the 27th (1972-73), 32nd (1977-78), 38th (1983), 43rd (1987-88), 50th (1993-94), 55th (1999-'00), 61st (2004-05), 66th (2009-10) and 68th (2011-12) rounds of NSS, at roughly 5-year intervals. The last survey has been conducted in during August, 2022 to July, 2023 (2022-23). The survey of 2023-24 is the latest one on the subject.

1.3 SURVEY COVERAGE

1.3.1 Geographical Coverage

1.3.1.0 The survey covered the whole of the Indian Union except a few inaccessible villages in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. The survey was conducted in 8,684 villages and 6,143 urban blocks covering 2,61,953 Households (1,54,357 in rural areas and 1,07,596 in urban areas). The distribution of the villages/urban blocks and households surveyed across different States/UTs for rural and urban areas is given in Table 1.1 at the end of this Chapter.

1.3.2 Population Coverage

- 1.3.2.0 All resident households located in the geographical territory of Indian union were considered in the survey with the following exclusions:
- 1.3.2.1 Floating population, i.e., persons without any normal residence, was excluded from the coverage of the survey. But persons residing in open spaces, roadside shelters, under bridges etc., more or less regularly in the same place were covered.
- 1.3.2.2 Foreign nationals as well as their domestic servants were excluded, if by definition the latter belonged to the foreign national's household. However, a foreign national who had become an Indian citizen for all practical purposes was covered.
- 1.3.2.3 Persons residing in barracks of military and paramilitary forces (like Police, Border Security Force, etc.) were kept outside the survey coverage. However, civilian population residing in their neighbourhood, including the family quarters of service personnel was covered.
- 1.3.2.4 Orphanages, rescue homes, ashrams and vagrant houses were outside the survey coverage. However, the persons staying in old age homes, the students staying in ashram/hostels and the residential staff (other than monks/nuns) of these ashrams were

covered. Although orphans living in orphanages were excluded, the persons looking after them and staying there were covered. Convicted prisoners undergoing sentence were kept outside the coverage of the survey.

1.4 QUESTIONNAIRES FOR THE SURVEY

1.4.1 HCES: 2023-24 has been conducted using three questionnaires identical to that of HCES:2022-23, namely, (i) Questionnaire: FDQ for Food items, (ii) Questionnaire: CSQ for Consumables and Services items, and (iii) Questionnaire: DGQ for Durable goods. These three questionnaires have been canvassed in the selected households in three separate consecutive monthly visits. A slightly modified version of Questionnaire: HCQ as used in HCES: 2022-23 after deleting items related to: (i) type of material used for construction of wall, floor and roof of the building, (ii) source of drinking water and time taken to fetch drinking water from the source, (iii) type of latrine used and type of access of the household to latrine, (iv) number of members of the household aged between 0 to 18 years died during the past 5 years preceding the date of survey etc. has been canvassed in HCES: 2023-24.

1.4.2 All possible six sequencing of the three questionnaires, namely, [(Q1, Q2, Q3), (Q1, Q3, Q2), (Q2, Q1, Q3), (Q2, Q3, Q1), (Q3, Q1, Q2) and (Q3, Q2, Q1)], where Q1 refers to FDQ, Q2 refers to CSQ and Q3 refers to DGQ, were used in the survey to eliminate any bias due to adoption of any particular sequencing of the questionnaires. The questionnaires are provided in Appendix D.

1.5 REFERENCE PERIOD

1.5.0 The consumption of any good or service by members of a household (individually or collectively) occurs in the form of a flow over time. The time period for which consumption is recorded is called the reference period. It may vary from item to item. As the respondents are asked to recall and report the volume of consumption over a fixed duration, the reference period is also called the recall period.

1.5.1 The reference periods used in the survey for different groups of items are given below:

III	Clothing; bedding; footwear; education; medical (hospitalization); durable goods	Last 365 days

1.5.2. Together, these reference periods are termed as Modified Mixed Reference Period (MMRP). Other reference periods used in past NSS surveys on household consumption are: Uniform Reference Period (URP) and Mixed Reference Period (MRP).

1.5.3 In URP approach, the household consumption expenditure on each item is recorded for a reference period of "last 30 days" while in MRP, the household consumption expenditure on – (i) clothing and bedding, footwear, education, institutional medical care (i.e., on hospitalization) and durable goods is recorded for a reference period of "last 365 days", and (ii) expenditure on all other items is recorded for a reference period of "last 30 days".

1.6 HOUSEHOLD

1.6.0 A group of persons normally living together and taking food from a common kitchen constitutes a household. It includes temporary stay-aways (with total period of absence from the household to be less than 6 months during the survey period) but excludes temporary visitors and guests (with total period of stay less than 6 months during the survey period).

1.6.1 Each inmate of a hostel, mess, hotel, boarding and lodging house etc., is considered as a single member household except that a family living in a hotel (say) is considered as one household only; the same applies to the residential staff of such establishments. Undertrial prisoners in jails and indoor patients of hospitals, nursing homes, etc., are considered as members of the households to which they last belonged.

1.7 HOUSEHOLD SIZE

1.7.0 The size of a household is the total number of persons staying in the household.

1.8 HOUSEHOLD CONSUMPTION EXPENITURE

1.8.0 It is the expenditure incurred by a household on domestic consumption during the reference period. Expenditure incurred towards entrepreneurial activities of households is excluded from household consumption expenditure.

1.8.1 The expenditure on purchase and construction of residential land and building, interest payments, insurance premium payments, payments of fines and penalties, and expenditure on gambling including lottery tickets are also excluded. Money given as remittance, charity, gift, etc. is also not considered in consumption expenditure. However, consumption of items produced in own farm or household enterprise is valued and included in household consumption expenditure. Also, goods and services received as payment in kind or free from employer, such as rent-free accommodation and free medical care, and reimbursement of travelling allowance for self & family excluding allowance for business trips are considered in household consumption expenditure.

1.8.2 For items of food, pan, tobacco, intoxicants and fuel & light, household consumption is measured by the quantity of the item actually used or consumed by the household during the reference period, regardless of the expenditure incurred on it. For evaluating household consumption of all other items, a different approach is followed: the

expenditure made by the household during the reference period for the purchase or acquisition of goods and services, regardless of when the goods and services are used and by whom, is considered as household consumption.

- 18.3. However, for some items such as rent, telephone charges, consumer taxes and railway season tickets, etc. expenditure during the month is recorded as the amount that was last paid divided by the number of months for which the payment was made.
- 1.8.4 The consumption of an item may be out of (a) purchases made in cash or credit during the reference period; (b) home-grown stock; (c) receipts in exchange of goods and services; (d) any other receipt like gift, charity and (e) free collection. Home produced items are evaluated at ex-farm price.
- 1.8.5 It is pertinent to mention here that the consumption expenditure of a household on food items relates to the actual consumption by the members of the household and also for the guests during ceremonies or otherwise. Any transfer payment made by the household such as, transfers of food, fuel made by a household as charity, loan advance etc. are not considered as consumption of that household. However, meals prepared in a household and served to non-household members are an exception to this rule. Meals prepared in the household's kitchen and provided to the employees and/or others are considered in domestic consumption of employer (payer) households. There is a practical difficulty in estimating the quantities and values of individual items used for preparing the meals served to employees or others. Thus, to avoid double counting, 'cooked meals received as perquisites' from the employer household or as gifts or charity are not recorded in the recipient household. As a general principle, cooked meals purchased by the household from the market for consumption by the members and the guests are also recorded in the purchaser household.

1.8.6 All goods and services received as payment in kind or perquisites are included in the consumption of the recipient household as goods and services received in exchange of services, except for meals received from other households.

1.8.7 With a view to simplify data collection and valuation, consumption of food processed at home from one "item" to another, such as milk converted to curd, vegetables used for pickles, and rice used for making liquor etc. are recorded against the primary or ingredient item(s), such as milk instead of curd, vegetables instead of pickle etc.

1.9 VALUE OF CONSUMPTION

1.9.0 For food, pan, tobacco, intoxicants and fuel & light items, consumption out of purchase is evaluated at the purchase price. Consumption out of home produce is evaluated at ex-farm price. Value of consumption out of gifts, free collections, and goods received in exchange of goods and services is imputed at the rate of average local retail prices prevailing during the reference period. Such valuation is made by the field officials at the time of collection of the data.

1.10 MONTHLY PER CAPITA CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE (MPCE)

1.10.0 The Monthly Per Capita Consumption Expenditure (MPCE) is defined as: total household monthly consumption expenditure divided by the household size. This measure serves as an indicator of the household's level of living.

1.10.1 Each individual's MPCE is defined as the MPCE of the household to which the person belongs. This assigns to each person a number representing his or her level of living. Thus, the intra-household allocation among the members of the household is ignored.

1.11 FRACTILES AND FRACTILE CLASSES OF MPCE

1.11.0 For any fraction f(0 < f < 1), the corresponding fractile of the distribution of MPCE is the level of MPCE, Y_f , such that the proportion of population whose household MPCE lies below Y_f is f. A fractile class of MPCE is a segment of the population lying within two fractiles, f_i and f_2 .

1.11.1 In this report, twelve fractile classes, represented as "0-5%", "5-10%", "10-20%", …, "95-100%" are used. Each of the first two classes contain 5% of the estimated population ranked by MPCE in ascending order, i.e., the bottom 5% of the estimated population belongs to the class "0-5%". Each of the next eight classes contain 10% of the estimated population ranked by MPCE in ascending order. The last two classes contain 5% each of the estimated population in which the fractile class "95-100%" represents top 5% of estimated population when ranked by MPCE in ascending order.

1.11.2 Estimates are often generated separately, for different fractile classes to assess the variation of any characteristics with variation in MPCE. In this report, MPCE fractile classes, formed separately for different States/UTs and at all-India level for rural and urban sectors have been used.

1.12 ISSUES RELATED TO COMPARABILITY

1.12.0 HCES: 2022-23 has undergone some changes as compared to the previous surveys on consumption expenditure. A brief account of the changes made in this survey are given below. As a methodology identical to that of HCES: 2022-23 and the same set questionnaires (except for some modifications in Questionnaire HCQ) have been used in HCES: 2023-24, the following are required to be noted while comparing the results of HCES: 2023-24 with those of the surveys conducted in 2011-12 and earlier.

(i) Item Coverage: The questionnaire used in HCES: 2011-12 (NSS 68th round) had around 347 items. In HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24, the questionnaire has been updated by inclusion of new items and merging some of the obsolete items together. The questionnaire of HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24 contains 405 items.

- (ii) Changes in Questionnaire: A single questionnaire has been used in all NSS surveys on household consumption expenditure prior to HCES: 2022-23. However, in HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24, three separate questionnaires covering (i) food items, (ii) consumables and services items and (iii) durable goods have been used. Further, another questionnaire has been canvassed for collecting information on household characteristics as well as demographic particulars of the members of the households.
- (iii) Multiple Visits for Data Collection: Contrary to the usual practice of single visit followed prior to 2022-23, three questionnaires, namely, FDQ, CSQ & DGQ have been canvassed at random in HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24 in a selected household in three consecutive monthly visits in a quarter. The questionnaire HCQ has always been canvassed during the first visit along with one of these three questionnaires.
- **(iv)** Change in Mode of Data Collection: Computer-Assisted Personal Interview (CAPI) method has been adopted in HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24 while all earlier surveys on the subject have been conducted in Pen-and-Paper Personal Interview (PAPI) method.

1.13 MAJOR STATES

1.13.0 This refers to the 18 States of India which had a population of 25 million or more according to the Census of 2011. The States are: Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Haryana, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha, Punjab, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal.

1.13.1 The state of Telangana was created in the year 2014 carving out from the state of Andhra Pradesh. However, considering the total population of Andhra Pradesh according to 2011 population Census, both Andhra Pradesh and Telangana have been included in the list of major states.

1.14 CONTENTS OF THIS DOCUMENT

1.14.0 This report is based on the Household Consumption Expenditure Survey conducted during August, 2023 to July, 2024. The report contains three Chapters with summary statements. This Chapter is the introductory one and provides a brief background of the survey in addition to elucidating some concepts and definitions used in the survey. Chapter 2 outlines the survey methodology and estimation procedure while the findings of the survey are discussed in Chapter 3. The detailed tables of indicators, namely, MPCE, per capita quantity consumption etc. at State/UT level are included in Appendix A. The detailed estimation procedure is presented in Appendix B. As a measure of efficacy of the estimates, the values of relative standard errors (RSE) of the MPCE figures for each State/UT are given in Appendix C and the survey questionnaires are included in Appendix D.

Chapter 7wo Survey Method & Estimation of MPCE

2.1 SAMPLING DESIGN

2.1.0 A multistage stratified sampling design, considering villages/urban blocks or sub-units of these as the first stage units has been used in the survey. The households are the ultimate stage units. Simple Random Sampling Without Replacement (SRSWOR) method is used for selecting the samples.

2.1.1 In order to ensure proper representation of households of different economic categories, all the households of a selected village/urban block are classified into three groups depending on a criterion based on (i) land possessed in rural areas and (ii) possession of car in urban areas as on the date of the survey. A total of 18 households with proportional representation from the three groups have been selected. The details of survey methodology and estimation procedure are provided in Appendix B.

2.2 ESTIMATION OF MPCE

2.2.0 The monthly per capita consumption expenditure (MPCE) of a household, defined as "the total value of monthly consumption of goods & services of the household divided by the number of members of the household" is based on the data collected from those households who provided information for all the three visits, i.e., the households from whom data pertaining to all the three questionnaires, namely, FDQ, CSQ and DGQ are available. The multiplier computed from the data of third visit is used for generation of the estimates.

- 2.2.1 It has been a practice in NSS household consumption expenditure surveys to impute the value figures at the time of collection of data in the field for consumption out of (i) home-grown/home-produced stock and (ii) gifts, free collection and goods received in exchange of goods and services etc. The same practice has been continued in HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24 and accordingly, estimates of MPCE have been generated. These estimates are presented in Section I of Chapter 3.
- 2.2.2 The National Statistical Commission suggested to make some provision in the survey questionnaires of HCES to collect information on items/services received free of cost by the households through various Social Welfare Schemes. Accordingly, a separate provision for collection of information on the quantity of consumption for a number of items, received and consumed by the households free of cost through various social welfare programmes, has been made in HCES: 2022-23 & HCES: 2023-24. Consequently, the value figures for (i) food items: Rice, Wheat/Atta, Jowar, Bajra, Maize, Ragi, Barley, Small Millets, Pulses, Gram, Salt, Sugar, Edible Oil and (ii) non-food items: Laptop/PC, Tablet, Mobile Handset, Bicycle, Motor Cycle/Scooty, Clothing (School uniform), Footwear (School shoe etc.) received free of cost by the households has been imputed using an appropriate method, in addition to the items as mentioned in para 2.2.1 above.
- 2.2.3 Further, from January 2023, PDS items distributed to the NFSA beneficiaries have also been made free and consequently, the value figures of these items have also been imputed. Thereafter, as in HCES: 2022-23, another set of estimates of MPCE has been generated for HCES: 2023-24. These estimates, referred as 'MPCE estimates with imputation' are presented in Section II of Chapter 3.
- 2.2.4 It may be noted that the benefits provided under PM-JAY or any other state specific schemes provide cashless access to healthcare services to the beneficiary at the point of delivery of service, i.e., hospital and the beneficiary does not have any information on the cost of the services availed. For such schemes, entire premium is borne by the Government

and the beneficiary does not contribute. Since HCES is not a record-based survey, often it is not possible to ascertain the exact ailment or disease for which the benefit has been availed. Hence, in view of the complexity and appropriateness involved in imputation of the expenditure for such services, no attempt has been made to impute the expenditure of health services availed by the households free of cost. For similar reasons, the expenditure for free education services (i.e., reimbursement/waiver of school or college fees) has also not been imputed.

2.3 METHOD USED FOR IMPUTATION OF VALUE

2.3.0 'MPCE estimates with imputation', as a second set of estimates of MPCE has been generated considering the imputed values of the following items, in addition to the items as mentioned in para 2.2.1 above:

2.3.1 The value figures of these free items have been imputed by identifying the unit price at which the beneficiary household would have bought the same if it is not received free of cost. While deciding on an appropriate method of imputation, it has been assumed that all households belonging to a particular sector, state and second stage stratum (SSS) are homogeneous in terms of purchasing power and have more or less similar consumption pattern. Besides, consideration of a representative unit price for each of the imputed items at Sector × State × Second Stage Stratum (SSS) level would also address the variation in state-level prices. Thus, the adopted imputation method has been essentially based on finding an item-wise unit price at which the majority of the households would have purchased the item during the reference period.

2.3.2 In the questionnaires of HCES, in addition to collection of information on quantity figures for items received free of cost, there is provision for gathering information on quantity and value of each of these items consumed by the households 'out of purchase' during the reference period. From these quantity and value figures of each of the items consumed by the households 'out of purchase', item-level unit prices (value/quantity) are calculated for all households belonging to a particular Sector \times State \times Second Stage Stratum (SSS) level combination. Thereafter, the modal unit price for a particular item is determined at Sector \times State \times SSS level. In the absence of availability of sufficient number of observations at Sector \times State \times SSS level, the modal unit values are determined at Sector \times State level. Using these item-wise modal unit prices, the total value of consumption of a particular free item is imputed as:

Imputed value = *Quantity consumed* × *Modal unit value*.

2.3.3 For computation of Mode, Kernel Density Estimation procedure has been used i.e., each discrete point (i.e., each unit value) has been replaced by Gaussian distribution (kernel). The probability density at any given point in the space is then estimated to be the sum of the kernels at the chosen point over all the discrete points (after proper normalization). The rule-of-thumb bandwidth estimator has been used to approximate the width of a kernel or bandwidth.

- 2.3.4 In most of the cases while computing unit prices, it has been observed that sufficient observations are not present for at least one SSS (out of three) at Sector \times State level. Therefore, to maintain uniformity, the unit prices for each item are calculated at the Sector \times State level.
- 2.3.5 The items that have been considered for imputation of the value figures of the items received free of cost are given in the tables below:

2.4 EFFICACY OF THE ESTIMATES OF MPCE

2.4.0 The efficacy of the estimates of average MPCE values for each State/UT has been measured in terms of Relative Standard Error (RSE), defined as:

$$RSE = \frac{Standard\ Error}{Estimate} \times 100\ \%.$$

2.4.1 The formula used for estimation of the RSE is provided in Appendix B. The estimated RSE values along with 95% confidence intervals for estimates of average MPCE figures are given in Appendix C.



3.1 INTRODUCTION

3.1.0 The prime indicator generated from the Household Consumption Expenditure Survey (HCES) is the average Monthly Per Capita Consumption Expenditure (MPCE), compiled at various level of disaggregation, namely, sector, State/UT or with regard to various characteristics of the households like household type, social group, etc. In addition, share of expenditure incurred on consumption of different types of items, share in quantity of consumption of various food items are also compiled from the information collected in HCES. Accordingly, discussions on the survey findings in this chapter are confined predominantly to these parameters. In addition, trend in MPCE covering past few NSS surveys on household consumption expenditure along with pattern in inequality in household consumption expenditure are also included in this Chapter.

3.1.1 As discussed in para 2.2.2 of Chapter 2, information on the quantity of consumption for a number of items, received and consumed by the households free of cost through various social welfare programmes has been collected in HCES: 2022-23 and HCES: 2023-24. Consequently, the value figures for (i) food items: Rice, Wheat/Atta, Jowar, Bajra, Maize, Ragi, Barley, Small Millets, Pulses, Gram, Salt, Sugar, Edible Oil and (ii) non-food items: Laptop/PC, Tablet, Mobile Handset, Bicycle, Motor Cycle/Scooty, Clothing (School uniform), Footwear (School shoe etc.) received free of cost by the households have been imputed using an appropriate method.

- 3.1.2 As a consequence, two sets of estimates of MPCE have been generated from HCES: 2023-24. The first one is by adopting the usual NSS practice of imputation of the value figures at the time of collection of data in the field for consumption out of homegrown/home-produced stock and; gifts, free collection and goods received in exchange of goods and services, etc. These estimates are presented in Section I of the present Chapter.
- 3.1.3 Another set of estimates of MPCE has been generated utilizing the imputed value figures of the items as mentioned in para 3.1.1 above in conjunction with adoption of usual NSS practice of imputation of values figures for the items by the field personnel as explained earlier. These estimates, referred as 'MPCE estimates with imputation' are presented in Section II of this Chapter.
- 3.1.4 Since the 'MPCE estimates with imputation' are derived using the imputed values of the items as mentioned in para 3.1.1, the estimates of MPCE using the conventional NSS practice and 'MPCE estimates with imputation' will vary. Accordingly, for any domain or classification, the fractile classes of MPCE for the two types of MPCE figures will not be identical due to the fact that the set of households in the corresponding fractile classes will not, in general, be identical. Hence, any comparison of either MPCE values or share of expenditure between the two sets of MPCE estimates across the fractile classes to assess the impact of social welfare schemes will not be meaningful. Consequently, estimates of MPCE values with imputation as well as various types of cross-classifications of the same by fractile classes of MPCE have not been generated.
- 3.1.5 Further, the fractile classes for rural and urban areas have been determined separately. Similarly, state-specific fractile classes are also derived and state-wise estimates for these classes are given in the detailed tables in Appendix A.
- 3.1.6 Apart from the average MPCE, the survey data has also been used to generate estimates of various parameters, separately for households for different fractile classes of MPCE. Among these, the absolute and percentage break-up of MPCE over categories of

consumption items, and quantity and value of per capita consumption of different cereals are important indicators.

- 3.1.7 The discussions in this chapter covers the following for rural and urban sectors:
 - (a) average MPCE and MPCE across fractile classes,
 - (b) trend in level of consumption,
 - (c) median and deciles of the distribution of population by MPCE,
 - (d) average MPCE across household size,
 - (e) share of various food and non-food item groups in total expenditure,
 - (f) inter-state variation in food and cereal consumption,
 - (g) trend in per capita quantity consumption of cereals,
 - (h) inter-state variation of expenditure for different food and non-food items,
 - (i) trend in pattern of consumption of broad item groups,
 - (j) average MPCE across social groups,
 - (k) average MPCE across household types,
 - (l) inequality in distribution of MPCE,
 - (m)comparison of two types of estimates of MPCE figures.

3.2 SECTION I: ESTIMATES OF MPCE

3.2.0 The estimates presented in this section have been generated without imputing the value figures of the items (as mentioned in Para 3.1.1) received free by the households through various social welfare programmes. The value figures shown in tables and statements throughout this chapter are expressed as nominal values, unless otherwise stated and represents expenditure in Indian Rupee as reported by the respondents.

3.2.1 AVERAGE MPCE: MAJOR STATES AND ALL-INDIA

3.2.1.0 The average MPCE in rural and urban India in 2023-24 has been estimated to be Rs. 4,122 and Rs. 6,996, respectively without considering the values of items received free of cost through various social welfare programmes (Table 3.1). Thus, the per capita expenditure level in the urban areas, in nominal terms, and ignoring rural-urban differences in price levels, has been about 70% more than that in the rural areas.

3.2.1.1 The average MPCE (Rs. 10,137) of the top 5% of the population is about 6 times of the average MPCE (Rs. 1,677) of bottom 5% of India's rural population. The gap in average MPCE between the bottom 5% and top 5% of the population is more pronounced in the urban areas than the rural areas: with average MPCE at Rs. 20,310 of top 5% of the population about 8.5 times of the average MPCE (Rs. 2,376) of the bottom 5% of the population in urban areas.

3.2.1.2 The increase in the average MPCE in 2023-24 from the level of 2022-23 has been the maximum for the bottom 5 to 10 % of India's population, for both rural and urban areas. A comparison of average MPCE across different fractile classes for HCES: 2022-23 and HCES: 2023-24 is given in Table 3.2.

3.2.1.3 The average MPCE figures for rural and urban areas of the 18 major states are shown in Table 3.3 for both the periods 2022-23 & 2023-24. It is observed that among the major states, MPCE is the lowest in Chhattisgarh in both the sectors rural as well as urban in

2022-23 & 2023-24 (for rural areas; Rs. 2,466 in 2022-23 & Rs. 2,739 in 2023-24 and for urban areas; Rs. 4,483 in 2022-23 & Rs. 4,927 in 2023-24). It is the highest in Kerala (Rs. 5,924 in 2022-23 & Rs. 6,611 in 2023-24) in rural areas and in Telangana (Rs. 8,158 in 2022-23 & Rs. 8,978 in 2023-24) in urban areas.

3.2.1.4 A wide variation in urban-rural difference in average MPCE is observed across the 18 major states in 2022-23 as well as in 2023-24. Among the 18 major states, there has been a decline in urban-rural gap in 11 states in 2023-24 from the level of 2022-23. The lowest

urban-rural gap in 2023-24 is observed in Kerala (about 18%) and highest in Jharkhand (around 83%).

3.2.2 TREND IN LEVEL OF CONSUMPTION IN NOMINAL AND REAL PRICES

3.2.2.0 In nominal prices, the average MPCE in 2023-24 has increased by about 9% in rural areas and 8% in urban areas from the level of 2022-23 while in 2011-12 prices the increase in MPCE, both in rural and urban areas has been around 4% from the level of 2022-23. Table 3.3 shows the trend in nominal and real values of MPCE for rural and urban India during the period 1999-'00 to 2023-24.





(ii) For the years 1999-'00, 2004-05 and 2009-10 the rural and urban MPCE estimates have been inflated using CPI(AL) and CPI(IW-General) respectively, to obtain the MPCE values at 2011-12 price. The MPCE estimates of 2022-23 and 2023-24 have been deflated using CPI(R) & CPI(U) for rural and urban sectors respectively to obtain the MPCE values at 2011-12 price.

3.2.2.1 Figures 1 and 2 represent the trend in average MPCE since 1999-'00 at nominal prices and 2011-12 prices, respectively.





3.2.3 MEDIAN AND DECILES OF THE MPCE DISTRIBUTION: MAJOR STATES

3.2.3.0 Tables 3.4R & 3.4U show the nine deciles, denoted by P10, P20, ..., P90 of distributions of MPCE for rural and urban sectors for the major states in India. The median level of rural MPCE has been about Rs. 3,674, i.e., half of the rural population belongs to households with MPCE below this level. In urban India, the median level of MPCE is about Rs. 5,956 indicating that half of the urban population has MPCE below this level. About 61.3% of the rural population of India has MPCE below the rural average of Rs. 4,122 and 62.9% of the urban population has MPCE below the urban average of Rs. 6,996.



3.2.4 MPCE AND HOUSEHOLD SIZE: ALL-INDIA

3.2.4.0 Figure 3 shows MPCE values for 10 different household sizes. A steady decline in MPCE figures is observed with an increase in the size of the household. The MPCE figures for single member households have been, on an average, the highest while it is observed to be the lowest for households with 10 or more members. The same scenario is found to be present in rural as well as in urban areas.

Chapter Three Summary of Findings



3.2.5 SHARES OF VARIOUS FOOD AND NON-FOOD ITEM GROUPS IN TOTAL EXPENDITURE: ALL-INDIA

3.2.5.0 Table 3.5 shows the absolute and percentage break-up of all-India rural and urban MPCE in 2023-24 into 10 broad groups of food items and 11 broad groups of non-food items. A graphical representation of the percentage share of food and non-food items in total MPCE is given in Figure 4. A similar break-up of MPCE for the States/UTs is given in Statement Tables 3 and 4.

3.2.5.1 It is observed that in 2023-24, in rural India, food accounted for about 47% of the value of the average rural Indian households' consumption. Among the food items, the contribution of beverages, refreshments and processed food has been the highest (9.84%) followed by milk & milk products (8.44%) and vegetables (6.03%) in rural India. The contribution of cereals and cereal substitutes in the expenditure has been about 4.99%.

Among non-food items, the maximum contribution has been of conveyance (7.59%) followed by medical (6.83%), clothing, bedding & footwear (6.63%) and durable goods (6.48%).

3.2.5.2 In urban India, the contribution of food in MPCE in 2023-24 has been about 40% and similar to rural India, the contribution of beverages, refreshments and processed food has been the highest (11.09%) in food expenditure followed by milk & milk products (7.19%) and vegetables (4.12%).

3.2.5.3 The share of non-food items in MPCE in urban India has been around 60%, about 7% more than that of rural India. Conveyance with 8.46% contribution has the largest share in non-food expenditure in urban India while other major components of non-food expenditure in urban India are miscellaneous goods & entertainment (6.92%), durable goods (6.87%), and rent (6.58%).

3.2.5.4 While interpreting observations from Table 3.5 above, the following needs to be considered:


3.2.5.5 All averages are computed taking the entire estimated population in the denominator. This fact may be borne in mind, specially, for those items showing very low average expenditure, like 'rent' and 'taxes and cesses' in rural India. The actual number of consuming persons in the population is not considered here for any of the item groups. For some item groups such as cereals, consuming persons would mean nearly the entire population; for other items, such as tobacco, it would obviously be much smaller.

3.2.5.6 "Expenditure" on food includes the value of self-consumed home produce, calculated at ex-farm prices. It also includes the value of food collected free, for example, from forests, imputed at prevailing local retail prices. "Expenditure" on fuel, likewise, includes the value of home-grown firewood, calculated at ex-farm prices, and the value of firewood and other fuel collected free, imputed at local retail prices.

3.2.5.7 "Processed food" refers to purchased food items such as jam, pickles, etc., the quantities and values of the individual ingredients of which are not known well enough to be reported against the detailed items listed in the consumer expenditure schedule. All food processed at home is accounted against the ingredients. For example, a sweet prepared at home and consumed is accounted in the household's (and the concerned State/UTs) consumption of cereals, sugar, milk, etc., but not in its consumption of processed food. Cooked meals and snacks purchased from outside are also considered in this category.

3.2.5.8 Spending on tailor-made clothing does not include tailoring charges, which are included in "consumer services".

3.2.5.9 Figure 4 below shows the percentage share of broad item groups in total MPCE for rural and urban sector.



3.2.6 INTER-STATE VARIATION IN FOOD AND CEREAL CONSUMPTION: MAJOR STATES

3.2.6.0 Table 3.6 shows the percentage share of cereals and food as a whole in total expenditure for the major states. The share of food in total consumption expenditure of rural households varies from 40.32% (in Kerala) to 53.22% (in Assam). For urban sector, the share of food in consumption expenditure varies from 36.14% (in Maharashtra) to 48.79% (in Bihar).

3.2.6.1 The share of cereals in total expenditure in rural India varies from 2.56% (in Punjab) to 7.90% (in Jharkhand). In urban India, the share varies from 2.75% (in Haryana) to 5.84% (in Jharkhand).

A gradual decline in per capita quantity consumption of cereals in rural as well as urban areas has been observed during the period 1999-'00 to 2023-24.

3.2.9 INTER-STATE VARIATION IN EXPENDITURE FOR DIFFERENT FOOD ITEMS: MAJOR STATES

3.2.9.0 Tables 3.9R and 3.9U below elucidate inter-state variation in food consumption pattern, with regard to contribution of cereals, processed food & beverages, milk & milk products, egg, fish & meat, vegetables and fruits to total food MPCE, separately for rural and urban sectors.

3.2.9.1 In rural sector, the share of the item category 'beverages, processed food etc.' in total food consumption has been maximum in 9 out of 18 major states. While the share of 'milk and milk products' has been the maximum in Gujarat, Haryana, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, in Kerala, 'egg, fish & meat' has the highest contribution. In urban sector also, the share of the item group 'beverages, processed food etc.' has been maximum in total food expenditure for almost all major states except for Chattisgarh, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh where maximum share of consumption has been for milk & milk products.

3.2.10 INTER-STATE VARIATION IN EXPENDITURE FOR DIFFERENT NON-FOOD ITEMS: MAJOR STATES

3.2.10.0 Tables 3.10R and 3.10U show inter-state variation in non-food consumption pattern, to the extent reflected in percentage share expenditure in total non-food MPCE with regard to monthly consumption expenditure on fuel & light, conveyance, education, medical, clothing, bedding & footwear, durable goods, and miscellaneous goods, separately for rural and urban sectors. For both rural and urban areas, conveyance has been found to be a major contributor to the total non-food expenditure of the households for almost all

the major states and it is closely followed by durable goods, medical, clothing, bedding & footwear and miscellaneous goods, entertainment.

3.2.11 TREND IN PATTERN OF CONSUMPTION OF BROAD ITEM GROUPS: ALL-INDIA

3.2.11.0 Tables 3.11R and 3.11U show changes in percentage composition of MPCE in terms of broad item groups as shown by the past five NSS surveys beginning with 1999-00 separately, for rural and urban sectors. The share of food is seen to have shrunk from 59.40% in 1999-00 to 47.04% in 2023-24 in the rural areas and from 48.06% to 39.68% in the urban areas during the corresponding period.

3.2.11.1 Although, there has been a decline in the share of food items like cereals, pulses & pulse products and sugar & salt over the period, the item category of "processed food, beverages, etc." has shown a remarkable growth in contribution to total MPCE in 2023-24 when compared with the earlier periods. The decline in the share has been the steepest for cereals which has come down to 4.89% in 2022-23 from 22.16% in 1999-'00 in rural India and for urban India, the corresponding share has declined to 3.62% in 2022-23 from 12.35% in 1999-'00. Similar trend in consumption of cereals continues in 2023-24.

3.2.12 AVERAGE MPCE ACROSS SOCIAL GROUPS: MAJOR STATES

3.2.12.0 Table 3.12 presents state-wise average rural and urban MPCE across different social groups for major states in India. The variation in MPCE among the social groups is the highest in Kerala in rural areas and in Haryana in urban areas. It is the least in Assam among the major state for both the sectors. Monthly average value of consumption per person across different social groups for each State/UTs and All-India is given in Statement Table 8.

3.2.13 AVERAGE MPCE ACROSS HOUSEHOLD TYPES: MAJOR STATES

3.2.13.0 Tables 3.13R and 3.13U present the average MPCE (rural and urban) by household type for each major state. It is observed that the households belonging to the 'regular wage/salary earning in non-agriculture' has the highest average MPCE (Rs. 5,005), followed by households with 'others' category (Rs. 4,747) in rural India. The rural households belonging to the category 'casual labour in agriculture' has the lowest MPCE (Rs. 3,652). In urban areas, the households of 'others' category has the highest average MPCE (Rs. 9,159) while it is the lowest for households of 'casual labour' category (Rs. 4,964).

3.2.13.1 Among the major states, the households belonging to the category 'others' has the highest average MPCE (Rs. 7,506) in Kerala, and it has the lowest average MPCE in the households belonging to the 'casual labour in agriculture' in Chhattisgarh (Rs. 2,606) in the rural areas. In the urban areas, the households belonging to the category 'others' has the highest average MPCE (Rs. 12,619) in Telangana, and it has the lowest average MPCE in the households belonging to the category 'casual labour' in Jharkhand (Rs. 3,440).


3.2.14.0 Table 3.14 gives the share of each all-India rural and urban fractile class in total consumption expenditure. A decline in the percentage share of consumption expenditure has been observed for the top three fractile classes of MPCE for rural as well as urban areas in 2023-24 from the level of 2022-23.

3.2.14.1 Consumption inequality, both in rural and urban areas has declined from the level of 2022-23. The Gini coefficient has declined to 0.237 in 2023-24 from 0.266 in 2022-23 for rural areas and to 0.284 in 2023-24 from 0.314 in 2022-23 for urban areas. (Table 3.15). The values of the Gini coefficient for major states for rural and urban areas are given in Table 3.16.



3.3 SECTION II: ESTIMATES OF MPCE - WITH IMPUTATION

3.3.0 The estimates of average MPCE presented here have been generated considering the imputed value figures of the items received free by the households through various social welfare programmes (as mentioned in para 3.1.1), in addition to the imputed values of consumption out of home produce, free collection, gifts etc. as explained in para 2.2.2 of Chapter 2. With a view to reduce redundancy and lessen burden of the readers, this section is not made an identical replica of Section I in terms of composition of sub-sections and contents thereof. Instead, in view of the fact that imputation is restricted to few selected items only, changes in the estimates of average MPCE figures by various cross-classifications with regard to different domains are presented in summarized tabular format along with a comparison with the MPCE figures discussed in Section I.

3.3.1 A separate data file containing the modal unit prices used for imputation of the value figures for (i) food items: Rice, Wheat/Atta, Jowar, Bajra, Maize, Ragi, Barley, Small Millets, Pulses, Gram, Salt, Sugar, Edible Oil and (ii) non-food items: Laptop/PC, Tablet, Mobile Handset, Bicycle, Motor Cycle/Scooty, Clothing (School uniform), Footwear (School shoe etc.) received free of cost by the households is being released with the unit level data. This would allow the users to generate estimates of MPCE and its various components with imputation at disaggregated levels.

3.3.2 COMPARISON OF TWO-SETS OF MPCE FIGURES: MAJOR STATES

3.3.2.0 A comparison of the average MPCE figures for major states using the conventional NSS approach as well as utilizing the imputed values of the items as mentioned in para 3.1.1 is given in Table 3.17. As a consequence of imputation, there is an

increase in the MPCE figures with imputation and this has also resulted in marginal decline in urban-rural differences in MPCE across all major states in rural as well as urban areas.

A Note for the Users of Unit Level Data of HCES: 2023-24

The objective of the Household Consumption Expenditure Survey (HCES): 2023-24 has been to collect information on consumption of goods and services by the households for generation of indicators for understanding the consumption and expenditure pattern, standard of living and well-being of the households. The main indicator compiled on the basis of the data collected through HCES is the Monthly Per Capita Consumption Expenditure (MPCE) of the household.

Like all other NSS surveys, in this survey too, there has been provision to collect information on household characteristics e.g., social group, religion, household type, etc. along with demographic particulars of household members, namely, age, marital status, highest educational level attained, etc. in Section 3 and Section 4 of the questionnaire HCQ. Information on these items of Sections 3 & 4 have been recorded by the survey enumerators on the basis of reporting by the respondents and no cross-check/validation of these has been done with the relevant documents. The purpose of gathering information on these auxiliary variables has been to generate estimates of the indicators related to the variables of interest by different types cross-classifications and not to generate any estimates like sex ratio, literacy rates, percentage of population by various social groups etc. on the basis of these auxiliary information. Consequently, data related to these auxiliary variables were recorded as reported by the respondent and not verified with any administrative record(s). Hence, the users of the unit level data are advised not to make use of the auxiliary information for estimation of indicators, as such an exercise would result in misleading and inappropriate conclusions.

The survey has also gathered auxiliary information on the following items:

- Online purchase/payment of some selected goods and services,
- Household's usual consumption expenditure in a month,
- Total expenditure incurred on online purchase/payment of food items/consumable & services items during the last 30 days and expenditure incurred on online purchase/payment of durable goods during the last 365 days etc.

The sole purpose of gathering on these items has been to check internal consistency and validation of the data and not to compile estimates/indicators based on this information. States/UTs have been regarded as the basic stratum in HCES: 2023-24. Thus, any attempt to generate estimates of MPCE below State/UT level may lead to inaccurate/inappropriate figures in the absence of availability of sufficient number of sample observations at district level and users should refrain from generating such estimates.

Appendix B

Survey Methodology & Estimation Procedure

Survey Methodology & Estimation Procedure

2.1 INTRODUCTION

2.1.0 The latest survey on household consumption expenditure (previously known as household consumer expenditure survey) was conducted during the period August 2023 to July 2024 in which information was collected from each sampled household in three questionnaires, namely, Questionnaire: FDQ (Food Items), Questionnaire: CSQ (Consumables & Services) and Questionnaire: DGQ (Durable Items) in three separate monthly visits in a quarter. Apart from these, another questionnaire, namely, Questionnaire: HCQ was canvassed to collect information on household characteristics.

2.2 SAMPLING DESIGN

2.2.0 In HCES: 2023-24, a multi-stage stratified sampling design was used where villages/urban blocks or sub-units of these were regarded as the First Stage Units (FSU) and the households were the Ultimate Stage Units (USU). Both the FSUs and USUs were selected with Simple Random Sampling Without Replacement (SRSWOR). 18 sample households were canvassed within an FSU.

2.2.1 CONCEPT OF PANEL

2.2.1.0 The survey period of HCES: 2023-24 was divided into 10 panels, each consisting of three months. The compositions of the panels were as below:

2.2.1.1 In each of these panels, an equal number of FSUs were allotted for survey to ensure uniform spread of the sample over the entire survey period. Because of arduous field conditions, panel restriction was not strictly enforced in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Lakshadweep, Ladakh and rural areas of Arunachal Pradesh and Nagaland.

2.2.1.2 In the first month of any panel, Questionnaire: HCQ along with any one of the questionnaires, i.e., FDQ/CSQ/DGQ were canvassed in the selected households. During the second month of the panel, any one from the remaining two questionnaires was canvassed and in the last month, the last questionnaire was canvassed. The sequence of the questionnaires to be canvassed in each month of a panel for a particular FSU was decided randomly to eliminate bias that may arise due to the adoption of a particular sequencing for canvassing. Thus, all six possible sequences, i.e., [(Q1, Q2, Q3), (Q1, Q3, Q2), (Q2, Q1, Q3), (Q2, Q3, Q1), (Q3, Q1, Q2) and (Q3, Q2, Q1)], where Q1 refers to FDQ, Q2 refers to CSQ and Q3 refers to DGQ, were canvassed at random in the sample households.

2.2.2 CHOICE OF FIRST STAGE UNIT / SAMPLING FRAME FOR FIRST STAGE UNIT

2.2.2.0 The sampling frame for urban sector is the list of Urban Frame Survey (UFS) blocks as per latest Urban Frame Survey and for rural sector, it is the list of villages as per

Census 2011 updated by removing those villages which are urbanized and included in latest UFS (till the time of sample selection). Sometimes, with a view to ensure uniformity in the size of FSUs and operational convenience, large villages/UFS blocks are notionally divided into smaller units of more or less equal size, known as sub-units depending on a pre-defined criteria based on population in the village or number of households in the UFS block. The sector-specific criteria for sub-unit formation are as below:

Rural Sector

(i) The number of SUs to be formed in the villages (with Census 2011 population of 1000 or more and except some States/UTs) are decided based on projected present population of the village. The criteria are given below:

(ii) For rural areas of Himachal Pradesh, Sikkim, Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Ladakh, Parts of Uttarakhand (except four districts Dehradun, Nainital, Haridwar and Udham Singh Nagar), Jammu and Kashmir (seven districts Poonch, Rajouri, Udhampur, Reasi, Doda, Kishtwar, Ramban) and Idukki district of Kerala; SU is formed in a village if population as per Census 2011 is more than or equals to 500. The criteria for the number of SU to be formed are as below:

Urban Sector:

(i) SUs are formed in those UFS blocks having more than or equal to 250 households. The number of SUs to be formed within the UFS blocks is decided by the following criteria:

Thus, the list of Villages / UFS Blocks / Sub-Units (for those villages or UFS blocks where sub-units are formed within) together formed the sampling frame for First Stage Unit selection.

2.2.3 STRATIFICATION OF FSUS

2.2.3.0 A State/UT is considered as a basic geographical unit for stratum formation in both the sectors for HCES:2023-24. The sector-specific stratification criteria are given below:

Rural Sector:

- (i) A **Special Stratum** comprising of all the uninhabited villages as per Census 2011 is formed at All-India level.
- (ii) From the remaining villages, two more strata are formed in each State/UT:
 - (a) Stratum 1: Comprising of the villages within a distance of 5 Kms from the district headquarter or from a city/town with more than 5 lakh population. This stratum is not formed if there are less than 50 such villages in the State/UT.
 - (b) Stratum 2: Rest of the villages.

Urban Sector: UFS blocks within each State/UT are divided into strata based on two criteria *i.e.*, Population as per Census 2011 and 'Affluence' status as indicated in UFS frame. The stratum compositions are as follows:

2.2.4 SUB-STRATIFICATION OF FSUS

2.2.4.0 In the **rural sector**, three groups of villages are formed within each stratum, except special rural stratum at all-India level based on the following criteria:

Group	Population of the village (as per Census 2011)
1	less than 250
2	250 to 499
3	≥ 500

2.2.4.1 Further, the sample size for a particular rural stratum is distributed among these 3 groups in proportion to population and if the group-wise allocation is more than 20, 2 or more sub-strata are formed in each group. If the number of FSUs in a particular group is very small, no sub-stratum is formed.

2.2.4.2 In the **urban sector**, if the sample size allocated for an urban stratum is more than 20, 2 or more sub-strata are formed based on the number of FSUs within that stratum.

2.2.5 SAMPLE SIZE

2.2.5.0 8,684 FSUs in the rural areas and 6,143 in the urban areas have been surveyed in HCES:2023-24. The total sample size of 14,827 FSUs has been allocated to State/UTs in proportion to Census 2011 population, subject to a minimum allocation of 40 FSUs.

2.2.6 SELECTION OF FSUS WITHIN A STRATUM/SUB-STRATUM

2.2.6.0 The required number of FSUs from each of the sub-strata is selected by SRSWOR scheme. The selected sample is divided into 10 Panels with 2 dependent sub-samples within each Panel. Three sequences of questionnaires are canvassed in the FSUs belonging to sub-sample 1 and remaining three sequences are canvassed in FSUs sub-sample 2.

2.2.7 FORMATION OF SUB-DIVISION

2.2.7.0 It has been experienced that in some of the selected FSUs, the actual present population is significantly higher than the projected population/Census population that causes operational inconvenience for listing of all the households. In such a situation, the selected FSU is notionally sub-divided into several smaller units, called Sub-division. The

criteria for determining the number of Sub-divisions to be formed in the selected rural (except areas mentioned in Point ii Para 1.2.2) /urban FSU is given below.

The multiplier computed from the data of third visit is used for generation of the estimates. Household size recorded at the time of canvassing of food questionnaire (FDQ) is considered for calculating MPCE.
