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#### SYNOPSIS

NSS Report No 206—Tables with notes on birth and death rates and fertility rates.

Twentieth round (July 65—June 66).

An enquiry on 'Population, Births and Deaths' was initiated in the 14th round (1958-59) of the National Sample Survey in accordance with the recommendation of the Planning Commission working group on 'Population and Vital Statistics', for building a firm estimate of population growth rate of the country. The enquiry was continued through subsequent rounds. This report presents the results of this enquiry based on the data collected during the 20th round (July 1965—June 1966).

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## TABLES WITH NOTES ON BIRTH AND DEATH RATES AND FERTILITY RATE

The report entitled "Tables with Notes on Birth and Death Rates and Fertility Rate, Twentieth Round: July 1965—June 1966" was prepared by the NSS Organisation on the basis of the sampling design and tabulation programme approved by the NSS Programme Advisory Committee which was responsible for formulating the NSS Programmes prior to the setting up of the Governing Council for NSSO and the views contained in the report are not necessarily those of the Government of India.\*

#### CHAPTER ONE

#### GENERAL

- Sample Survey (NSS) the enquiry on 'Population, Births and Deaths' was initiated through Schedule 12 in accordance with the recommendation of the Planning Commission Working Group on 'Population and Vital Statistics' for building a firm estimate of growth rate of the country. The enquiry was repeated in the subsequent rounds of the NSS till the twenty-third round. The results of the enquiry for the fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth rounds were presented in NSS Report Numbers 48 & 76, 110 & 153, 180, 154, 121 & 175 and 177 & 185 respectively.
- 1.2 The survey covered both the rural and the urban areas of the Indian Union excepting the following regions: Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Laccadive, Minicoy and Amindivi Islands, Ladak district of Jammu & Kashmir, NEFA, Nagaland, Mao Ukhrul and Tamenlong sub-division of Manipur and Lungleh sub-division of Mizo (Lashai) hills of Assam.
- 1.3 In this report, estimates of birth rate, death rate, neonatal, postnatal and infant mortality rates, marital fertility rate (by membership type and education standard), average age at effective marriage for married women (by education standard), average interval between successive births (by order of birth and age at effective marriage) and average number of children ever born to ever married females (by age at effective marriage and marriage duration) obtained from the data collected in the twentieth round (July 1965—June 1966) have been presented. The estimates at the state level have been presented in Appendix I.
- 1.4 Items of information.—Information on sex, age, marital status for individual household members and that on membership type (husband and wife living together, husband and wife alive but not living together and husband and wife divorced and separated and widowed), education standard of husband, age at effective marriage, marriage duration and number of children born alive for all ever married female members were collected. Information on births included mother's age at effective marriage, at first birth and at reported birth, interval since previous birth, order of birth, sex of the child, whether born dead, age on the date of survey if alive on that date, age at death if born alive but since dead, time of birth (date, calendar month and year), how the time of birth was determined, type of attendance, place of birth, relation of child to informant, membership type of parent, and education standard of father and mother and that on death—sex and age of deceased, time of death, how the time of death was determined, type of attendance, place of death, relation of deceased to informant.

- 1.5 Organisation.—The field Directorate of the National Sample Survey of the Government of India collected the information (except for West Bengal and Bombay City which were directly covered by staff of Indian Statistical Institute) while the Indian Statistical Institute was responsible for the sample design, the schedules of investigation and instructions to field staff.
- 1.6 Participation of states.—All states except West Bengal participated with (central) National Sample Survey in the enquiry on a full matching basis, taking an independent sample, but following the same sample design, concepts and defination as those of the Central Sample.
- 1.7 The sample design was stratified with two-stage selection within each stratum in both rural and urban sectors, the first stage units were village/block in rural/urban areas and the second stage units, the households. The sample design was self-weighting at the state level. A note on the sample design is given in Appendix II.
- 1.8 Distribution of sample villages/blocks.— The total number of villages/blocks and households surveyed and number of sample persons, births and deaths enumerated in the survey are presented in Tables (1.1) and (1.2). As some villages and blocks could not be surveyed, these sample villages/blocks were substituted at the tabulation stage.

#### CHAPTER TWO

#### CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 Definitions of a household.—A dejure concept was adopted and a household was considered to consist of its normal resident numbers only. Persons who normally pass nights under the same roof and take food from the same kitchen, irrespective of the immediate length of stay in the household, were considered as normally resident members in the household. Normally resident members thus excluded guests but included temporary absentees. The decision as to whether a particular person would be treated as a normally resident member was left to the informant, the judgement of the investigator being exercised to know that a person was (a) not claimed to be a normally resident member in more than one household or (b) not totally omitted: a person to be considered a normally resident member should not have formed a separate household or joined, as a usual member, another household. The inmates (including staff) of a mess, hostel, boarding and lodging house, hotel, orphanage, vagrant home etc. were treated as single member households. The count of the population was on a defacto basis only for the floating population (i. e., population without any normal residence) who were looked for and counted in the place (within the sample villages/blocks) where they were found at the time of investigation.
- 2.2 Extinct household.—It should be noted that the frame consisted of the extant households only. The population would refer to that obtained on the date of survey and would, by definition, exclude households which ceased to exist consequent on death of all members. An item on "do you know of any extinct household in the sample village/block?" was provided for in the schedule of enquiry for cliciting information on the extinct households in the reference period.
- 2.3(a) Birth and death rates.—The number of births and deaths that occurred to the usual members of the household during two years—preceding the survey was recorded with the date of occurrence of each event. The events that occurred during 365 days preceding the survey were taken into account in calculating annual vital rates. The survey period was July 1965—June 1966; the reference period (365 days preceding the date of enquiry) was thus a moving one and covered the period July 1964—June 1966. The results presented do not refer to a fixed time period but refer to the overlapping time period spread over the period July 1964—June 1966. The method is aimed at minimising omissions in reporting arising from recallapse (or memory failure). The estimated population as on the date of enquiry was taken as the base in calculating the birth and death rates. The rate of natural increase of population is the balance of birth rate over—death rate.
- (b) Infant mortality rate.—This relates to the number of children dying before attaining one year of life during 365 days preceding the survey to the total number of children born alive during the same period.
- (c) Neonatal mortality rate.—This relates to the number of children dying at age 0-3 weeks during 365 days preceding the survey to the total number children born alive during the same period .
- (d) Postnatal mortality rate.—This relates to the number of children dying at age 4—51 weeks during 365 days preceding the survey to the total number of children born alive during the same period.
- 2.4 Marital fertility rate.—It was estimated by relating the estimated total number of livebirths that occurred during the year preceding survey to the estimated number of married females aged 15—44 years. The marital fertility rate by membership type was obtained by relating the estimated total number of live-births that occurred to the married females with specified membership type to the estimated number of same married females aged 15—44 years.
- 2.5 Average number of children born alive/born alive but since dead.—These ratios were calculated by relating estimated aggregate of total children born alive/born alive but since dead to estimated number of ever married women.

- 2.6 Age at effective marriage.—The effective marriage of husband and wife was reckoned to start when they began to cohabit. In case of women married more than once, the age at effective marriage for the first marriage was taken into account.
- 2.7 Average age at effective marriage of married women.—It was obtained by relating estimated aggregate of ages at effective marriage of married women to the estimated number of married women.
- 2.8 Average interval between successive births.—It was calculated for biths that occurred during 365 days preceding the survey by relating estimated aggregate of intervals for any order of birth to estimated aggregates of the corresponding order of birth. In case of first birth, the period between age at effective marriage and first birth was taken into account. In case of multiple births, the period between two consecutive Births (of multiple births) was taken as 'O'
- 2.9 Marriage duration.—This was determined by relating age at effective marriage to present age in case of married women and age at termination of marriage in case of widowed/divorced/separated women. In case of multiple marriages, marriage duration was determined by relating age at first effective marriage to spresent age for marriage women and by relating age at first effective marriage to age at termination of last marriage for widowed/divorced/separated women.

#### CHAPTER THREE

#### SUMMARY OF RESULTS

3.1 The data on births and deaths were collected for events that occurred during last two years preceding survey. The annual rates of birth, death and natural increase, neonatal, postnatal and infant mortality rates, marital fertility rate and average interval between two successive births were estimated on the basis of events that occurred during last year (365 days preceding survey). Broad findings of the survey are given below .

A. Annual rates of birth, death and natural increase and neonatal, postnatal and infant mortality rates 3.2 Table (3.1) gives the annual rates of birth, death and natural increase for rural and urban areas. The annual birth rate (per 1000 population) was estimated at 36.30 and 30.32 in rural and urban areas respectively. The annual death rate (per 1000 population) came

out at 11.85 and 7.20 in rural and urban areas respectively. The rate of natural increase (per 1000 population) was estimated at 24.45 and 23.12 in rural and urban areas respectively.

3.3 Table(3.2) shows the neonatal, postnatal and infant mortality rates by sex for rural and urban areas. In case of male infants, neonatal and postnatal rates (per 1000 male live-births) were estimated at 63 and 44 respectively in rural areas and 41 and 30 respectively in urban areas. The estimated male-neonatal rate was higher than estimated male-postnatal rate in both rural and urban areas. In case of female infants, neonatal and postnatal rates (per 1000 female livebirths) were estimated at 46 and 47 respectively in rural areas and 32 and 34 respectively in urban areas. Thus, in case of female infants, estimated neonatal and postnatal rates came out to be of the same order of magnitude in both rural and urban areas. This might be due to under reporting of female-infant deaths at age o-3 weeks and error in reporting age at death. The estimated neonatal rate for male infants came out to be higher than that for female infants and estimated postnatal rate for male infants came out to be lower than that for female infants in both rural and urban areas.

The male-infant mortality rate (per 1000 male live-births) was estimated at 107 and 71 and the female-infant mortality rate (per 1000 female live-births) at 94 and 67 in rural and urban areas respectively. The infant mortality rate (per 1000 live -births) came out at 102 and 69 in rural and urban areas respectively.

#### B. Marital fertility rate

3.4 Marital fertility rates were obtained separately for (i) membership type: (a) husband and wife living together; (b) husband and wife not living together (as members of different households, husband visiting his family regularly or occassionally); (ii) education standard of wife and (iii) education standard of husband.

3.5 Table (3.3) shows marital fertility rates by membership type for rural and urban sectors. Marital fertility rate was estimated at nearly 200 for rural sector and at nearly 190 for urban sector. In rural areas, marital fertility rate for wives living with their husbands came out nearly 13 times that for wives not living with their husbands. In urban areas, marital fertility rate for wives living with their husbands came out to be nearly twice that for wives not living with their husbands. The very high marital fertility for wives living with their husbands may be due to higher proportion of wives in the age range at which fertility is high.

- 3.6 Table (3.4) gives murital fertility rates by wife's education standard for rural and urban sectors. The estimate for rural wives having general education at graduation level being based on small number of samples would be subject to large sampling error. The estimates of murital fertility rate for wives having different livels of general education (illiterate, literate but below primary, primary but below secondary and secondary) came out to be of the same order of magnitude in both rural and urban sectors. Marital fertility rate for urban wives having general education at graduation level was estimated at a slightly lower level (nearly 155 against 190 for illiterate wives and for wives having general education at a level lower than graduation).
- 3.7 Table (3.5) presents marital fertility rates of wives by the education standard of husband for rural and urban sectors. In rural area, marital fertility rates for wives of illiterate husbands and of husbands having general education at a level higher and lower than secondary level came out to be of the same order of magnitude (nearly 200) and came out at a level slightly lower than that (nearly 225) for wives of husbands having general education at secondary level. In urban areas, marital fertility rates of wives of illiterate husbands and of husbands having general education at a level below secondary and at secondary level were estimated at the same level (nearly 190) and the same for wives of graduate husbands was estimated at a slightly lower level (nearly 170).

- C. Average number of children born alive and born alive but since dead to ever married women by age at effective marriage and marriage duration.
- Estimate of average number of children born alive to ever-married women (of all religions) by age at effective marriage and marriage duration for rural and urban sectors is presented in Table (3.6). At marriage duration less than 6 years, average number of children born alive to ever married women rises with increasing age at effective marriage in both rural and urban areas. At marriage duration of 6-9 years, nearly 2 children are born alive to ever married women (irrespective of age at effective marriage) in both rural and urban areas. At marriage duration of 10-15 years, 16-25 years and 26 to 35 years, the average number of children born alive to ever married women having effective marriage at an age below 20 years are 3.5, slightly more than 5 and 6 respectively and the same to ever married women married at age 20 years above are 3 children, 5 children and 5.5 children respectively in both rural and urban areas. The average number of children born alive to ever married women having effective marriage at an age below 20 years at marriage duration of 36 years and above being nearly of the same order of magnitude as that at marriage duration of 26-35 year, it is observed that nearly 6 children are born to ever married women having effective marriage at an age below 20 years in their reproductive life in both rural and urban areas. It may also be observed that nearly 5.5 children are born to ever married women married at age 20 years and above in their reproductive life in both rural and urban areas (the estimate of 6.61 for urban women is subject to large sampling error the estimate being based on data of small number of ever married women)

3.9 Estimate of average number of children born alive but since dead to ever married women by age at effective marriage and marriage duration for rural and urban sectors is shown in Table (3.7). Out of the children born alive to ever married women having effective marriage at an age below 20 years one child, on an average, died when the marriage duration ranged within 10—15 years and two children died with the duration between 26—35 years in both rural and urban areas. Out of the children born alive to ever married women married at age 20 years and above one child, on the average died at a stage between 16 years and 20 years after marriage and nearly 1 and a half children died at marriage duration of 26—35 years in both rural and urban areas. Nearly 6 children and 5.5 children were estimated to be born to ever married women having effective marriage at an age below 20 years and at an age 20 years and above in their reproductive life [Table (3.6)]. Thus it is seen that in both rural and urban areas, ever married women would have 4 surviving children, on the average, irrespective of age at effective marriage at marriage duration of 26—35 years.

# D. Average interval (months) between two successive births by order of birth and mother's age at effective marriage

3.10 Table (3.8) gives estimated average interval between two successive births by birth order and mother's age at effective marriage for rural and urban sectors. The average interval between effective marriage and first birth for rural sector was estimated at 53 months for mothers having effective marriage at an age below 15 years, at 40 months for mothers having effective marrige at an age between 15 and 19 years and at 35 months for mothers married at 20 years and above and the same for urban sector was estimated at 46 months, 36 months and 28 months for mothers having effective marriage at an age below 15 years, 15-19 years and 20 years and above respectively. The estimated average interval between first and second birth came out at 40 months for mothers having effective marriage at an age below 20 years and at 37 months for mothers married at age 20 years and above for rural areas while the same came out at 43 months and 35 months for mothers having effective marriage at an age below 15 years and 15 years and above for urban areas. The estimated average interval between two births for third, fourth, fifth and sixth birth order for mothers having effective marriage at an age below 20 years was estimated at nearly 37 months for both rural and urban areas. The same for urban mothers married at 20 years and above was estimated at nearly 35 months. In case of rural mothers married at 20 years and above, average interval between births for third and fourth birth order came out at nearly 35 months and for fifth and sixth birth order at nearly 48 months. For seventh and higher birth order average interval between births came out at nearly 36 months for both rural and urban areas. It may also be observed that average interval between effective marriage and first birth decreases with increas in age at effective marriage in both rural and urban sectors. The age at effective marriage differential in average interval between births is pronounced in case of births of first, second and third order in urban areas. The rural urban differential in average interval between births is observed to be pronounced in case of births of first and second order only.

## E. Average age at effective marriage of married women by education standard

3.11 Table (3.9) shows estimated average age at effective marriage of married women by education standard and sector. In both rural and urban sectors average age at effective marriage rises with increasing level of general education of married women. The average age at effective marriage was estimated to be lowest (nearly 15 years) in case of literate women and highest (nearly 20 years) or women having general education at graduation level in both rural and urban areas. The average age at effective marriage for women who passed secondary examination came out at 19 years and the same for literate women and for women who passed primary examination at 16 years.

## APPENDIX II SAMPLE DESIGN AND ESTIMATION PROCEDURE



#### SAMPLE DESIGN AND ESTIMATION PROCEDURE

A 2.1 Sample Design (Rural)

A 2.1.1 Sampling frame.—The sample design is stratified two-stage with villages as first stage units and households as the second-stage units. The frame used for selection was the list of villages as per 1961 population census. Though the unit of selection was the census village, the unit of survey was taken as the revenue village(s) corresponding to the sampled census village. The design was sell-weighting at the State level.

A 2.1.2 Stratification.—The country was divided into about 50 agricultural regions during the 16th round of the NSS by grouping contiguous districts of a State having similar crop patterns and population densities. These regions had been used in the subsequent rounds, and remainded the same in twentieth round also except for some changes in Gujarat, Rajasthan, Tripura and Manipur. Strata were formed within each region by grouping contiguous tehsils having similar population densities and altitudes and having good transport and communication facilities amongst them, as for as possible, such that the sum of the size measures of the villages for each stratum within a State/Union Territory was the same. The size of a village was the ratio of its population to the average population of a village in the population class o—499 of that State, rounded off to a suitable integer. The number of strata to be formed in a State was obtained as the ratio of its allocation to 24 and the total size measure of a stratum was given by the ratio of the total size for the State to the number of strata. For equalising the stratum sizes and making them multiples of 12, the sizes of some villages had been suitably increased or decreased without however deviating much from their original sizes.

A 2.1.3 Selection of villages.—The tehsils within each stratum were arranged in a serpentine order by considering georgaphical contiguity and 4 independent sub-samples of 12 villages each were selected circular systematically with probability proportional to size (pps), size being related to population as mentioned earlier. In each sub-sample the villages with odd orders of selection formed the central sample and those with even orders of selection formed the state sample. For either state or central sample, the interval for selection was I=Z/6 where Z is the total size of the stratum. Clearly, I was same for all the strata within a State or Union Territory.

A 2.1.4 Hamlet group Selection.—In large villages where listing of households would be time consuming, the investigator formed a specified number of hamlet groups of approximately equal population content and confined the survey to one of them selected with equal probability.

A 2.1.5 Selection of households.—The households in a sample village/hamlet group were arranged in the following 6 classes on the basis of household size and means of livelihood class and then a linear systematic sample of households (22 on the average) was drawn to form the combined sample.:

From this combined sample, a sub-sample of 2 households on the average was selected linear systematically with interval=11 for the integrated household enquiry. All the remaining households (20 households on the average) were surveyed for the enquiry on population, Births and Deaths.

#### A 2.2 Sample Design (Urban)

A 2.2.1 Sampling frame.—The sample design was stratified two stage with urban block as the first stage units and households as the second stage units. For block selection, the UFS frame had been used for all cities and towns whose population in 1961 was 50,000 or more, (Sector 1) and for about half the number of the remaining towns having population in 1961 less than 50,000 (Sector 2); and the 1961 census frame had been used in the rest of the Sector 2 towns. The design was self weighting at the Sector level within each state.

A 2.2.2 Stratification.—In each state/Union Territory, cities and tonws with population 50,000 or more in the 1961 census formed one stratum (Sector 1) and rest of the towns of the 1961 census formed the other stratum (Sector 2). In Maharashtra 3 strata were formed: Bombay city (Sector 0), the rest of Sector 1, and Sector 2.

A 2.2.3 Selection of Blocks—In sector 1 of each State, the block had been selected circulars systematically with probability proportional to size (pps), the size of each block being taken as its estimated population (as supplied in the UFS frame) rounded off to the next multiple of 1000. In Sector 2, the towns had been classified by their means of livelihood pattern as per 1961 census, into three classes: (1) agricultural, (2) industry, trades, transport etc. and (3) others, on the basis of proportion of persons in these classes. Charges in the sizes of some blocks had been made so as to make the interval for selection of blocks an integer. From Sector 1 and Sector 2, the urban blocks were selected in the form of 4 independent interpenetrating sub-samples (pps), systematically, the size being as described above, using in Sector 2 twice the sampling interval used for Sector 1.

A 2.2.4 Division of Blocks.—After a study of the total estimated population of the sample blocks separately in sub samples 1 & 3 & 2 & 4 of each State block, if it was found that this work load exceeded the desired average of about 160 households per block, the very big blocks were subdivided in order to reduce the workload. The number of sub blocks (into which a blocks was to be divided) was fixed so as to be a sub-multiple of the size. The investigator formed the required number of sub-blocks of about equal population content and selected one of them with equal probability for survey.

A 2.2.5 Selection of Households.—From each sample block/sub-block, a combined sample of 22 households on the average were selected linear systematically after arranging all the households in it in the following 6 classes based on number unemployed, household size and number self-employed.
