

SECTION ONE

INTRODUCTION

- restaurants, transport, storage & warehousing and service sector was carried out by the National Sample Survey Organisation in the thirtyfourth round of its survey from 1st July 1979 to 30th June 1980. This was a follow-up survey of the first Economic Census which was conducted by the Central Statistical Organisation during the last quarter of 1977. In the Economic Census some broad information about non-agricultural enterprises of the country was collected. As a follow-up of the Economic Census detailed sample surveys of small scale enterprises in (i) manufacture & (ii) trade, hotel & restaurant, transport, storage & warehousing and service sector were conducted by the NSSO respectively in the 33rd and 34th round of the NSS.
- 1.2 The survey in the 34th round of the NSS covered the entire geographical area of the Indian Union except Sikkim, Andaman & Nicober Islands, Lakshadweep, Dadra & Nagar Haveli and the rural area of Nagaland. Two tehsils of district Surguja and four tehsils of district Bastar of Madhya Pradesh, three tehsil of district Chandrapur and one tehsil of district Amravati of Maharashtra and Ladakh district of Jammu & Kashmir were also not covered.
- 1.3 The Governments of all the States and Union Territories participating in the National Sample Survey programme participated in the survey by canvassing samples at least of equal size as the central sample in the respective States and Union Territories.

- 1.4 In the Economic Census enterprises were classified into two groups namely, (1) own account enterprises (OAE) i.e., enterprises without any hired worker and (11) establishments i.e. enterprises with at least one hired worker. Establishments having hired workers were further classified into two categories namely, (a) non-directory establishments (NDE) i.e. establishments with total number of workers including household worker, if any, 5 or less and annual output/turnover/receipt less than Rs.1,00,000 and (b) directory establishments (DE) i.e., establishments with 6 or more workers and/or annual output/turnover/receipt Rs.1,00,000 or more. The survey conducted by the NSSO in the thirtyfourth round was restricted to non-directory establishments. and own account enterprises in trade, hotel & restaurant, transport, storage & warehousing and service sector. The enquiry for the directory establishments was covered by a separate survey conducted by the C.S.O. during October 1979 to September 1980. Government and public sector enterprises were kept out of the purview of the survey.
- The basic design for the survey was a two-stage stratified one with enumeration block (EB) formed during the Economic Census as the first stage units (f.s.u) and enterprises as the ultimate units of enumeration. In each sample f.s.u. enterprises which had operated for atleast 30 days (or 15 days for seasonal enterprises) during the last 365 days and existed on the date of survey formed the frame for selection of enterprises. A sample of own account enterprises and non-directory establishments in trade, hotel and restaurants, transport, storage & warehousing and service sector was selected for the detailed enquiry in each sample EB.
- Transport enterprise means rendering transport service to others as a business proposition. It includes the act of carrying passengers and/or goods from one place to another. Supporting services incidental to transport such as packing, freighting, travel agency also fall under transport enterprises. All activities covered by NIC major group 70-73 of NIC division 7

a/ National Industral Classification (NIC)-1970, issued by C.S.O.

constitute transport activities. In this round for the transport sector under survey coverage three different schedules were can-vassed namely, Schedule 2.31B for mechanised passenger and goods transport, Schedule 2.32B for non-mechanised passenger and goods transport and Schedule 2.33B for services incidental to transport. NIC group 700 - railway transport and NIC major group 72 - air transport were kept out of the coverage of the Survey.

1.7 The report is based on the data collected in Schedule 2.33B canvassed in the Central Sample for non-directory establishments and own account enterprises engaged in (i) pipeline transport (NIC code 707); (ii) supporting services to land transport like operation of high-way bridges, toll roads, vehicular tunnels, parking lots etc. (NIC code 708); (iii) supporting services to water transport like operation and maintenance of piers, docks, pilotage, light houses, loading and discharging of vessels etc. (NIC code 712) and (iv) services incidental to transport, such as packing, crating, travel agency etc. (NIC code 730). It gives number of non-directory establishments & own-account enterprises, estimated employment, earnings, expenditure and operating surplus. at all-India level separately by rural & urban sectors. Section Two gives concepts and definitions used in the survey and Section Three presents summary findings of the survey. Appendix-I gives the statistical tables. A note on sample design and estimation procedure is given in Appendix-II. The facsimile of the schedule of investigation is given in Appendix-III.

SECTION TWO

CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 Some of the important concepts and definitions followed in the survey are given below.
- 2.2 Enterprise: An enterprise was an undertaking engaged in production and/or distribution of some goods and/or services not for the sole purpose of domestic consumption and carried out by members of a household/institutional body by hiring outside labour or not. An enterprise might be owned and operated by a single household, or by several households jointly on a partner—ship basis, or by an institutional body.
- 2.3 Own Account Enterprises: An enterprise which was operated without any hired worker was called an own-account enterprise. Household members, if paid, were treated as hired workers and such enterprises were not treated as own account enterprises.
- Establishment: An enterprise with atleast one hired worker on a fairly regular basis was called an establishments. A directory establishment was one which had six or more workers (including both household and hired) and/or whose annual output/turnover/receipts was Rs. one lakh or more. On the other hand an establishment having less than six workers and annual output/turnover/receipt less than Rs. one lakh was termed a non-directory establishment.
- Services incidental to transport enterprises: This included enterprises engaged in (i) pipeline transport (NIC code 707); (ii) supporting services to land transport like operations of highway bridges, toll roads, vehicular tunnels, parking lots etc. (NIC code 708); (iii) supporting services to water transport like operation and maintenance of piers, docks, pilotage, light-houses, loading and discharging of vessels etc. (NIC code 712) and (iv) services incidental to transport such as packing, crating, travel agency etc. (NIC code 730).

- 2.6 Proprietory: When an individual was the sole owner of the enterprise type of ownership was proprietory.
- 2.7 Partnership 1 Where there were two or more owners of the enterprise on a partnership basis, with or without formal registration, type of ownership of the enterprise was categorised as partnership.
- 2.8 <u>Institutional Ownership</u>: When the enterprise was owned by a private limited company or a public limited company or a cooperative society, etc., the ownership was called institutional.
- 2.9 <u>Hired staff</u>: This included primary workers as well as supervisory and clerical staff. Apprentices paid or unpaid are also included.
- 2.10 Not hired staff: This included working proprietors, unpaid family workers and co-operative members.
- 2.11 <u>Total emoluments</u>: This comprised of salaries, wages and allowances etc., bonus paid, value of benefits provided to individuals, imputed value of group benefits in kind and employers contribution to social security and other payments.
- 2.12 Rent on fixed assets: It was the rent payable for the reference year for assets hired by the enterprise.
- 2.13 <u>Interest on loan</u>: Interest payable on outstanding loan, if any, for the reference year was taken as interest on loan,
- 2.14 Total expenditure: This consisted of total emoluments paid, rent on assets not owned by the enterprise, interest on loan and repair and maintenance expenditure incurred on building and other assets like transport equipments, tools and appliences etc. It includes also expenses incurred on services purchased from other concerns and also expenses on stationary, postage, bank and legal charges etc.
- 2.15 <u>Total receipts:</u> Total earnings from the services offered by the enterprise including fees, commission and other receipts were taken as total receipts.
- 2.16 Operating surplus: Total receipts minus total expenditure was taken as operating surplus.
- 2.17 <u>Value added</u>: Total emoluments, rent for assets not owned and interest on loan when added to operating surplus was value added.

SECTION: THREE SUMMARY RESULTS

3.1 Table 1 presents estimated number of enterprise by (1) type of ownership of enterprise and (11) enterprise type at all India level separately by sectors.

From item 1.3 of the table it is seen that at all-India level there were 18934 enterprises of which 7002 were located in rural sector and 11,932 in urban sector i.e. about 37 pc and 63 pc of the enterprises were located respectively in the rural and urban sectors. From columns (2) & (3) it is seen that a small fraction of the enterprises, nearly $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 pc of the enterprises, in the rural sector & 2 pc of the enterprises in the urban sector were institutional, the residual being non-institutional. From items 2.1 - 2.3 of the table it is seen that in the rural sector of 7002 enterprises, 5307 were OAE & 1695 were NDE i.e. about 24 pc of the enterprises were nondirectory establishments, the residual being own account enterprises. In the urban sector, however, of the total number of 11932 enterprises, 5849 enterprises, constituting 52 pc of the enterprises were non-directory establishments.

3.2 Table 2 below shows estimated total employment by enterprise type at all India level separately by sectors.

From items 1.5 of the table it is seen that at allIndia level total employment in services incidental to transport
36,527 of which 10116 was contributed by the rural sector
and 26411 by the urban sector. In terms of employment therefore
about 72 pc was claimed by the urban sector and residual 28 pc
by the rural sector.

3.3 Table 3 below presents annual operating surplus per enterprise by enterprise type at all India separately by sectors.

From items 1.1 - 1.3 of the table it is seen that operating surplus per establishments in the rural, urban and sectors combined for OAE & NDE combined were Rs. 3391, Rs. 7574, Rs.5871 respectively. In the rural sector per enterprise operating surplus for CAE and NBE were respectively Rs. 2860 and 5054. Similarly in the urban sector per enterprise operating surplus for OAE and NDE were respectively Rs.4173 and Rs. 11353. It is seen that per enterprise operating surplus for OAE in the urban sector was about one and half times the corresponding estimate for the rural sector. Similarly for NBE per enterprise operating surplus in the urban sector was more than double the corresponding estimate for the rural sector. Aggregate annual pperating surplus for OAE + NDE combined at all-India level generated from number of enterprises and per enterprise operating surplus, for the rural, urban and sectors combined were Rs. 2.37 crores. Rs. 38.74 crores and Rs. 11.15 crores respectively. At all-India level the urban sector claimed a major share, viz about 78 pc of total annual operating surplus.

APPENDIX - _ .

SAMPLE LESIGN AND ESTIMATION PROLEDURE

- 1. <u>Rasic design</u>: The sample design in both rural and urban areas was a stratified two stage one with enumeration blocks (EBs) of economic census being first stage units and enterprises in sample ESs being second stage units.
- 2. Stratification: here were 75 regions all over India (explaing areas not covered by MSS). These regions were formed within a state/maion territory except in Gujarat by grouping contiguous districts of similar agricultural profile. In Gujarat, regions were formed by grouping contiguous teledle taking into consideration the concertration of tribal population and dry areas of the state. Each district was treated as a stratum except in Gujarat where parcs of district belonging to different regions were treated as different strata.
- 3. Sampling frame: The enumeration blocks (ED) formed during 1977 Economic Consus showing the number of DE and NDE for the different industries for each EP were used as sampling frame for the selection of EBs, the first/units of campling. However, due to non-availability of ECeframe, WFS frame was used as the sampling frame for the urban areas of Lagaland and 1971 census list of villages was used as sampling frame for meral areas of Chandigarh.
- +. Sub-stratum : All the EBs in tach district/stratum were divided into 2 sub-stratum. Sub-stratum 1 consisted of all BBs having at least one DE/or NDE in any of the 4 industries namely, (i) trade, (ii) hotel and restaurant, (iii) transport and (iv) storage and worehousing. Resignal EBs of astituted sub-stratum 2. However, in rural areas of Gujarate 3 sub-strata were formed by sub-dividing sub-stratum 2 in two parts, vic. EBs not having any DE or NDE in any of the 4 industries specified above but containing at least one DE and/or NDE in any of the remaining industries covered by the Economic Consus constituted sub-stratum 2 and the residual Ebs constituted sub-stratum 2 and the residual

- 5. Allocation: The total sample size of enumeration blocks for the state/union territory was fixed on the basis of the number of investigators available for the survey in the state. The total number of sample EBs in a state or union territory was allocated to the rural and urban sectors of the districts in proportion to total bumber of directory and non-directory establishments in the four industries (viz. trade, hotel and restaurant, transport, and storage and warehousing) in the respective districts and sectors. District-wice sample size was distributed between sub-stratum 1 and 2 approximately in the ratio 5 is 1, separately for the rural and urban sectors.
- 6. Selection of EBs: Sample EBs were selected from sub-stratum 1 with probability proportional to total number of DE + NDE under the industries namely, (i) trade, (ii) hotel and restaurant, (iii) transport, and (iv) storage and warehousing with replacement. From sub-stratum 2 sample EBs were selected at random.
- 7. Sub-division of EBs : Normally each sample EB was completely surveyed. But where the EB population exceeded 1,000 or number of DE + NDE exceeded 200, the EB was sub-divided into two or more sub-blocks of nearly equal population or DE + NDE content and the survey was confined to one of the sub-blocks selected at random.
- 8. Sampling of enterprises: There were 11 schedules of enquiry for the different enterprises under survey coverage as:

In each sample: EB all the CAEs eligible for sch. 2.51B were surveyed. ed. Also in each EB a maximum of 12 MDEs were surveyed. Further in each EB 3 CAEs other than CAEs eligible for sch. 2.51B were surveyed. In EBs having no eligible MDE. CAEs were surveyed.

NDE: Much total number of NDE gligible for survey exceeded 12 in an BB, 12 sample NDEs were distributed over different schedule types as follows. First, one NDE was allotted to each schedule type. Next, one more was allotted to each schedule of type in the priority order/schedules 2.513, 2.328, 2.333, 2.348, 2.528, 2.538, 2.558, 2.418 and 2.428 until the total number of sample NDEs became 12. This procedure was repeated as many times as warranted to arrive at 12 sample NDEs. Circular systematic sample of NDEs was aslected independently from each schedule type.
